While science is complex, and some jargon is unavoidable, this does not justify the continuing trend







Jargon-free summaries of EFSA's risk assessments written for non-technical audiences

Also known as lay summaries, patient summaries, nontechnical summaries.....



Quick entrée into EFSA risk assessments for non-specialists

Save reader's time with concise, readable summaries

Facilitate understanding for non-native English speakers

Promote accurate media reporting

Not dumbing down of science



Usually drafted by authors: resource implications for EFSA but workarounds are available
