- ➤ December 2016 grant agreement with Institute of Food Safety, Animal Health and Environment «BIOR» was signed
- ➤ Baltic countries workshop on crisis preparedness March 15-17, 2016, Riga (Latvia)
- > Future the report will be published on EFSA's website

- ➤ To build capacity in the Baltic countries on crisis preparedness for food crisis and to stimulate coollaboration needed during outbreak investigation
- ➤ To enhance the food safety crisis preparedness for the Baltic countries
- ➤ To bring key players of Baltic countries involved in food crisis together to improve cooperation and communication channels between Baltic countries, EFSA, the EC and key stakeholders during food crisis
- > To exchange experience and promote scientific cooperation
- > EFSA has an interest to get countries prepared in case it need the support of MSs for data collection during outbreak investigation
